# The Garniers: Two German Immigrants Begin an American Family

1. **ROBERT EMIL<sup>1</sup> GARNIER** was born 9 November 1865 in Friedrichsdorf, Germany and died in Queens, New York on 29 May 1945.<sup>1</sup> He married **AUGUSTA CAROLINE WILHELMINE KORNSTEDT** on 24 March 1887 in Jersey City, Hudson County, New Jersey.<sup>2</sup> She was born 2 August 1867 in Bredow, Pomerania, Prussia.<sup>3</sup> She died 31 October 1947 in Hollis, Queens, New York.<sup>4</sup>

## The Parentage of Robert Emil Garnier

Although Robert's death certificate lists his father as Emil and his mother as unknown, Augusta, the informant, can be considered an unreliable source for these pieces of information as she likely never met her husband's parents.<sup>5</sup>

Robert is believed to have been the son of Frederic Alexandre Garnier and his second wife, Marie Marguerite Lotz.<sup>6</sup> The evidence supporting this includes:

• The marriage return filed for Robert and Augusta's wedding lists Robert's parents as Alexander Garnier and Marie Lutz.<sup>7</sup> Although he gives his father's middle name instead of his formal name, and a slight difference in

- spelling is noted in his mother's maiden name, this form would have been completed by Robert who had firsthand knowledge as to the identity of his parents.
- An excerpt from *Hessische Familienbücher [Hessian Family Books]*, lists a son, Emil Robert Garnier, born to Frederic Alexandre Garnier and his second wife, Marie Marguerite Lotz, on 9 November 1866.<sup>8</sup> While the day and month are consistent with the date of birth used by Robert, the birth year listed is one year later than his date of birth as listed on his death certificate. The year as listed in the compilation is thought to be an error. Emil was the listed given name of three sons in the family, which may explain why he later went by Robert Emil instead of his given name of Emil Robert.<sup>9</sup> Also, in some regions of Germany, children would be baptized with two or more names, and when brothers shared a first name, they would often all go by their second name.<sup>10</sup>
- In the same *Hessische Familienbücher [Hessian Family Books]*, a daughter, Henriette Sophie Garnier, is also listed for Frederic Alexandre Garnier and Marie Marguerite Lotz.<sup>11</sup> Her relationship to their parents is well established.<sup>12</sup> Her son, Friedrich Lutz, listed Robert E. Garnier as his uncle upon his arrival at Ellis Island in 1905.<sup>13</sup> This supports that Robert

and Sophie were siblings, and therefore Sophie's parents can be reasoned to Robert's parents.

#### The Childhood of Robert Emil Garnier

The town of Robert's birth and childhood, Friedrichsdorf, was a unique place with a distinct history. After French Catholic King Louis XIV revoked the Edict of Nantes in 1685, which had protected the rights of minority Protestant Christians in France, French Huguenots were forced to either convert to Catholicism or flee the violent persecution that ensued. 14 A fellow Protestant, German Prince Frederick II, offered a group of these French Huguenots land within the state of Hesse, Germany. Friedrichsdorf, named after their benefactor, was founded in 1687.<sup>15</sup> Two hundred years later, the town was still a French Huguenot village, with its people bilingual by necessity: German was needed to conduct secular affairs with the surrounding areas while a 17th century version of French was used at home and for worship. Inhabitants of Friedrichsdorf "consider it derogatory to intermarry with their German neighbors," but they still considered "Germany as their county... for which, if need be, they would fight and die."<sup>16</sup>

Robert was the tenth child born to his father, Frederic Alexandre Garnier and the ninth child of Frederic's second wife, Marie Marguerite Lotz. The family would grow to thirteen children in total. 17 Frederic Alexandre was a teacher, which positioned the family as bourgeois (middle-class) in Friedrichsdorf. <sup>18</sup> Solid social position wasn't a guard against family difficulties, however; Robert's mother, Marie Marguerite, died when he was only nine years old in May 1875. Frederic Alexander remarried the following year, however, he too passed away in April 1878 when Robert was just twelve years old.<sup>19</sup>

Robert left Germany and arrived in America before reaching the age of eighteen.<sup>20</sup> It is believed that he came to America in 1882, the year which recorded the highest level of German immigration to America, or the following year of 1883.<sup>21</sup> Land shortages, economic pressures of industrialization, and lack of political rights were some of the reasons so many Germans emigrated during that timeframe.<sup>22</sup> By 1885, he was living on Henderson Street in Jersey City.<sup>23</sup>

## Jersey City: A "Golden Door" for Immigrants

Jersey City is located in northeastern New Jersey, directly across the Hudson River from lower Manhattan. The mid to late 1800s were a distinct period of growth for Jersey City. It was a major transportation hub, with several railroad terminals from various lines, along with the ferries and barges that crossed the

river into New York City.<sup>24</sup> The Emigrant Landing Depot at Castle Garden, which operated from 1855 to 1890 prior to the opening of Ellis Island, was also located in lower Manhattan, directly across the Hudson from Jersey City.<sup>25</sup> A steady stream of immigrant labor, factories with easy access to both rail and boat transportation, and proximity to New York City were several factors for Jersey City's success. By 1860, more than half of the adult male population of Jersey City was foreign born, with 11% of the adult males reporting German birth. The Germans that settled in Jersey City were largely successful, with almost three-quarters of them reporting being employed in white-collar or skilled labor positions.<sup>26</sup>

## The Parentage and Childhood of Augusta Carolina Wilhelmine Kornstedt

Augusta was the daughter of Otto Kornstedt and his wife, Auguste Ulrich.<sup>27</sup> She was born 2 August 1867 in Bredow, part of the city of Stettin, in what was at that time Prussia.<sup>28</sup> Located in the Oder River delta adjacent to the Baltic Sea, Stettin was a major port city of the German Empire.<sup>29</sup>

In early summer 1870, when Augusta was just shy of three years old, the family journeyed to the United States, along with older brother, Gustave, and younger sister, Elise.<sup>30</sup> It is believed the family settled in Jersey City, New Jersey,

as a younger brother, Johann Wilhelm Kornstedt, was born there 25 May 1874 and baptized at a German church in nearby Hoboken the following month.<sup>31</sup> The toddler died in Jersey City in December of the following year.<sup>32</sup> While it is unknown what impact the child's death had on the family's decision regarding where to live, the family remained in Jersey City for a year or so after Johann's death and then returned to Bredow.<sup>33</sup> A sister, Philippine, was born in Bredow on 7 January 1877.<sup>34</sup> It was not a permanent move, however, as the family returned to Jersey City by 1882.<sup>35</sup>

## **Robert and Augusta's Long Life Together**

It was in Jersey City that young immigrants Robert Emil Garnier and Augusta Kornstedt most likely met and married. Although their family bible lists the date of their marriage as 5 November 1886, their marriage more likely occurred several months later on 24 March 1887, as evidenced by their marriage return which bears that handwritten date, along with a stamp showing that the return was filed the following day.<sup>36</sup> The reason for the discrepancy in these dates most likely

relates to the date of the birth of their first child: daughter Elsye Elizabeth was born 24 August 1887, only five months after the date on their civil marriage record, but ten months after the date recorded in the family bible.<sup>37</sup> The young couple may have lied about the date of their marriage to hide that Elsye was conceived prior to their marriage.

At the beginning of their married life, Robert and Augusta lived with her parents and siblings in Jersey City at 88 Woodward Street.<sup>38</sup> By 1889, the young family had left New Jersey for Brooklyn, New York.<sup>39</sup> In 1892, the couple and daughter, Elsye, shared a Brooklyn home with Augusta's 15-year-old sister, Philippine, known as Bena.<sup>40</sup> In 1895, the couple had a second child, Robert Irving Garnier.<sup>41</sup>

During the first half of their marriage, Robert was a professional portrait artist. For twenty-four years he owned his own business, "where he copied photographs in crayon or water-color, or oil." <sup>42</sup> He must have been fairly successful, as by 1900 the family owned the Brooklyn house they lived in, although with a mortgage. <sup>43</sup>

Various penmanship and ink colors indicate that entries were made separately over various years. Photographs taken of and provided by Warren Garnier, Jr. to Michelle Torosian 16 October 2021 indicate that several pages at the front of Bible are missing, including that which listed the publisher and place of publication. Other pages indicate publishing date of 1886. Bible had been in the possession of Norman Garnier, grandson of Robert and Augusta Garnier, then given to his nephew, Warren A. Garnier, Jr., great-grandson of Robert and Augusta Garnier.

By 1910, Robert was working for Mueller's Macaroni.<sup>44</sup> This company was founded in Jersey City by another German immigrant, Christian Friedrich Mueller.<sup>45</sup> Augusta's sister, Bena, had married Mr. Mueller's son, Christian, Jr., known as Fred, in 1897.<sup>46</sup> Robert's artistic talents may have been used to design the company's early packaging, which dates to 1907.<sup>47</sup> Robert rose to district manager for Mueller's, during a time when the company experienced tremendous growth.<sup>48</sup> A new factory was opened in Jersey City in 1915, which at the time was the "world's largest and most modern macaroni plant" and was therefore poised to increase capacity when World War I cut off pasta imports from Italy.<sup>49</sup> From 1928-1935, Robert drove in excess of 300,000 miles in his sales role for Mueller's.<sup>50</sup>

At some point between 1912 and 1913, the Garniers moved from Brooklyn to Queens.<sup>51</sup> In 1915, 1920 and 1925 the Garnier family lived in Woodhaven, Queens.<sup>52</sup> By 1930, Robert and Augusta had moved to a Hollis,

Queens house on 111<sup>th</sup> Avenue, which would be their home for the rest of their lives.<sup>53</sup>

#### **Robert's Natural Death**

After fifty-eight years of marriage with Augusta, Robert passed away at home on 29 May 1945 of natural causes.<sup>54</sup> He was buried at Evergreens Cemetery a few days later, in the Ascension section of the cemetery, plot 2735.<sup>55</sup>

#### **Augusta's Tragic Death**

Augusta would survive her husband for two more years; however, her eventual death was not caused by illness or old age. On Halloween evening in 1947, at approximately 5:30 pm, Augusta was struck and killed by an automobile while crossing the intersection at Farmers Avenue and 110th Road, only a short block and a half from home.<sup>56</sup> The sun had just set about a half hour prior to the collision at 4:53pm and it may have been raining, both of which could have hampered visibility and the driver's ability to brake.<sup>57</sup> Augusta was buried alongside Robert in Evergreens Cemetery.<sup>58</sup>

3. ii. ROBERT IRVING GARNIER. Born 26 April 1895 in Brooklyn, New York. Died 14 February 1964 in West Columbia, South Carolina.<sup>62</sup> Married Natalie Myerson 10 April 1918 in Brooklyn, New York.<sup>63</sup>

#### **Proof Summary**

No birth certificate has been located for Robert Irving Garnier despite the wide availability of these records for his reported birth in Brooklyn on 26 April 1895.<sup>64</sup> Robert Irving's death certificate is blank in the fields for his parents' names.<sup>65</sup> An analysis of other sources, however, supports the assertion that his parents were almost certainly Robert Emil Garnier and his wife, Augusta (Kornstedt) Garnier.

- On his marriage record to Natalie Myerson, Robert Irving's parents are listed as Robert E. [Garnier] and Augusta Kornstedt. Robert Irving would have known his parents and he signed the document, certifying that the information given was correct, and establishing that he provided this information.<sup>66</sup>
- Robert Irving is enumerated with parents Robert and Augusta and listed as "son" in the U.S. census records for 1900 and 1910, and in the New York State census for 1905 and 1915.<sup>67</sup>
- A newspaper article written on Robert Emil and Augusta for the celebration of their 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary mentions their son, Irving.<sup>68</sup>
